There's new writing from Donegal with Ruth McGowan's Lovesongs for Losers and there's Edinburgh Festival Fringe success coming to Donegal in the form of Pat Kinevan's multi award-winning show, Silent, in Ballybofey.

NorthWest Opera are back at The Balor Arts Centre with one of the most popular operas of all time, Georges Bizet's Carmen. With a cast of professional singers from Germany, America, Bulgaria and Donegal, and a live Orchestra, this will be a night of passionate opera not to be missed.

Festival audiences can look forward to the best of Donegal and visiting music with a revival of Margaret McGinley's evocative Glenveagh Suite, by Marie Askin and Friends, at Ballyshannon; Tara Connaghan, Denise Boyle and Paul Anderson in Glencolmcille; Danny Meehan and a special tribute to the great Teelin fiddle player, the late Frank Cassidy, at the Donegal Fiddlers Gathering in Glenties; Rainy Boy Sleep and the exciting new Dune Collective in Ballyshannon, the Rare Groove Funk Orchestra in Bundoran and the best of bluegrass with Woodbine in Kilcar.

We are extremely happy to welcome RTE Radio 1's iconic **Sunday Miscellany** show back to the Festival for a second time. The show's producer and presenter **Cliodhna Ni Anluain** has gathered

together a mouth watering line-up of writers and musicians, including **Carlo Gebler**, **Moya Cannon**, **Little John Nee**, **Frank Galligan**, **Anthony Glavin**, the **Donegal Chamber Orchestra** and **Doimnic Mac Ghiolla Bhride**, for your enjoyment. The radio show will be recorded live at The Abbey Centre, Ballyshannon on Sunday afternoon. October 9.

The visual arts enjoy a strong presence in this year's programme, led by renowned Kerry artist **Michael Flaherty**'s wonderful studies of Ballyshannon, the exhibition of which will be staged at the Abbey Arts Centre and opened on October 1st. by the Minister of State at the Department of Arts, Heritage and The Gaeltacht, **Mr. Dinny McGinley TD**. At the same time, the six artists of the Meitheal Ealaine artists group, **Deborah J. Stockdale**, **Margaret Cunningham**, **Ana Stromberg**, **Rik Walton**, **Tom McLaughlin** and **Michael Doherty**, will open their group show in Glencolmcille, while **James McManus**' new solo show opens in Donegal Town on Friday night, September 30.

The Festival's heartiest congratulations go to Marcel Otten at the **Man-made images Photo Gallery** in Mountcharles on the occasion of the gallery's 5th. anniversary which be celebrated with a group show featuring one signature work from each of the 23 artists who have exhibited there, since it opened in 2006.

I remember the kitchen throbbing with the beat of Irish dance music beamed to us all the way from Dublin, and my mother and her sisters suddenly catching hands and dancing a spontaneous step-dance and laughing – screaming! – like excited schoolgirls ...'



Its 1936 and harvest time in Donegal. In a house just outside the village of Ballybeg live the five Mundy sisters – schoolmistress Kate, housekeeper Maggie, craft knitters Agnes and Rose and the youngest, Chris – barely making ends meet. The two male members of



the household are their brother Jack – a missionary priest repatriated from Africa by his superiors after twenty five years of service – and Michael, Chris' seven year old child, who now as an adult narrates the

story that unfolds over three eventful weeks in the month of August.

Dancing At Lughnasa opened to enormous public acclaim at The Abbey Theatre in early 1990. The following year, with Rosaleen Lenihan playing the role of Kate, it travelled to The National Theatre in London where it won the **Lawrence Olivier**

Award for Best Play and thereafter was staged at The Plymouth Theatre on Broadway, where it won the Tony Award for Best Play in 1992. The play was revived in 2000 and 2004 to further success at the Abbey and Gate theatres respectively and in 2009, a production featuring the three Cusack sisters – Sorcha, Niamh and Sinéad – and Andrea Corr, had a very successful run at the Young Vic Theatre in London

This Donegal Drama Circle production for Donegal Bay and Blue Stacks Festival is directed by Christian Carbin and features Suzanne Thomas, Margaret Timoney, Catherine Martin, Karen McCrudden, Conor Friery, Sean McLoone and Christian Carbin. Design is by Art Kavanagh and Martin Crawford.



Set, like so many of Friel's plays, in the fictional Donegal village of Ballybeg, Aristocrats explores similar themes to his 19th century set drama The Home Place except here the focus in on an upper class Catholic family and the action takes place in the 1970s.



Ballybeg Hall is the decaying home of District Justice O'Donnell where those who return for a wedding stay on to attend a funeral. Friel's chronicle of three sisters and their brother reveals the way in which the changing fortunes of one

family become the metaphor for a whole society and a way of life.

First produced by the Abbey Theatre in 1979, Aristocrats won the **Evening Standard Award for Best Play** (1988) and the **New York Drama Critics Circle Award for Best Foreign Play** (1989).

This latest Donegal production opens at An Grianán Theatre on September 28th. and closes its run, very appropriately, in the Community Centre in Glenties which is generally accepted to be the model for Friel's fictional village of Ballybeg.

Director **Iarla McGowan** is from Letterkenny and is now based in London. His performances earlier this year as Richard III in Love and Madness' stylish production of the Shakespearean classic were the subject of rave reviews across the UK and Ireland. He founded **Workhouse** theatre company in 2009 and directed their first show, Conor McPherson's The Weir, in a sold-out run at the Regional Cultural Centre in December of that year.

An Grianán and Workhouse have assembled a stellar cast for this hugely anticipated production, including Gerard McSorley, Clare McMahon, Maura Logue, Orla McGranaghan, Sean Hanrahan, Chris O'Shea, Sean Byrne, Sean McCormack, Jamie Menard and Elaine Gillespie. Design is by Abby Price, Joanne Quigley and Niall Cranny. The show is produced by Patricia McBride.

This **Festival Opening Night** performance of The Glenveagh Suite will be preceded by the unveiling by Frankie McGinley of a portrait of the composer, the late **Margaret McGinley**, painted by artist Barry Sweeney. The portrait has been specially commissioned by **Cairde Mhairéad Nic Fhionnghaile** and will go on permanent display at the Abbey Arts Centre.

This year marks the 150th. anniversary of the infamous Derryveagh Evictions, when North Donegal landlord John George Adair ('Black Jack') evicted 47 families - over 250 people - from his Glenveagh estates to make room for his new sheep rearing enterprise.



The original Glenveagh Suite was composed by Margaret McGinley, the gifted Ballyshannon musician, composer and teacher, and was first performed at Glenveagh Castle in September 1989. The Suite tells the story in music, song and dance of the beauty of Glenveagh and of the tragedy of the Evictions of 1861.

In this special Donegal Bay and Blue Stacks Festival opening event, Ballyshannonn composer and arranger, Marie Askin, has chosen to work with a group of former students of Margaret McGinley to present a selection of pieces from the original Suite, all linked by a new narrative in the voice of

John George Adair's American-born wife, Cornelia, the work of Rosnowlagh playwright Soinbhe Lally. The part of Lady Adair will be played by Tracey Ferguson while Conor Carney will offer a contemporary account of the social and political context of the time, reading selections from William Allingham's impassioned and highly charged narrative, Laurence Bloomfield in Ireland: A Modern Poem, published in 1864.
